As we begin to experience colder weather, please make sure you child comes to school prepared for outdoor temperatures wearing winter coats, sweaters, hats and gloves or mittens. We assess daily outdoor temperatures and determine from this whether the children have outdoor recess at lunch time. If your child has any difficulties with the cold weather i.e. asthma symptoms or if they have a cold, please let us know and we can adjust their recess accordingly.

The Common Cold:

While the average adult catches two-four colds per year, the average child can get anywhere from six to ten a year. This is because children have weaker immune systems and have close contact with other children in school. A cold can last from one to two weeks bringing with it fatigue, runny nose, sore throat and muscle aches. Colds are caused by viruses and are spread by contact with infected people. Colds are spread by a person with the virus sneezing or coughing into their hand and then touching the hand of a healthy person who then touches their nose. Symptoms of a cold include runny nose,

sneezing, cough, sore throat, tiredness and decreased appetite. These symptoms should disappear gradually in seven to ten days.

Treatment:

An older child usually doesn't need to see a doctor unless symptoms become more serious i.e. high fever, persistent cough for more than a week, persistent headache.

Unfortunately there is no cure for the common cold. Antibiotics are used to combat bacterial infections, but they have no effect on viruses. The best you can do is to make your child comfortable, make sure he gets extra rest and drinks more fluids. If your child is very uncomfortable you can give Tylenol or ibuprofen. Be sure to follow the recommended dosage for age and weight. Using over the counter medications can be more harmful than beneficial. It is best to check with your pediatrician before using them. They often dry the respiratory passages and make nasal secretions thicker. Some may cause drowsiness and others increase heart rate. Most over the counter cold preparations contain more than one ingredient. You could be giving the same ingredient from two different medications. For example, if you give a cough medication and a cold medication you could be giving double of one of the ingredients.

Here are some tips to manage skin care in the winter months:

Cold weather steals the skin's moisture.

To keep your child's skin soft and healthy:

- Have your child take warm, not hot showers using a mild soap like Dove.
- After bathing apply a moisturizer to damp skin.
- Make sure children wear gloves or mittens when going outside.
- Supply your child with a tube of lip moisturizer to keep in his/her pocket to prevent cracked lips and remind you child not to lick his/her lips when outdoors.
- If your child develops red or itchy patches especially behind the knees and insides of the elbow, apply a generous amount of moisturizing cream. If this does not improve see your pediatrician.

A Note About Fast Foods:

Fast foods are a lot of things: fast, convenient and fun. But can they be healthy? The rise in families substituting a trip to MacDonald's, Burger King or Wendy's for a family meal at home is likely to be one of the causes in overweight children, but it is not the only cause. Other factors are the increase in time watching TV and playing video games instead of physical exercise. How can you make fast foods healthy? One of the easiest ways is to watch portion size and understand how many calories and how much fat you add to a meal when you supersize you order. For example, at MacDonald's the difference between small burger (240 calories) or a Big Mac (530 calories) and a ¼ Pounder with cheese (740 calories) can be 290-500 calories. If you add a 16 oz. Triple Thick Shake that would add 530 calories and an order of fries adds 230 calories.

The total calories of the supersize servings would equal the calorie requirement for a child for a whole day. Become accustomed to looking at the calorie charts that are posted in fast food establishments and avoid supersizing.

We all have been working hard learning new strategies that good readers use, such as using picture clues, visualizing, and asking questions to help figure the meaning of a story and unfamiliar words.

The children have been doing a wonderful job in Writer's Workshop! The focus this month was writing Realistic Fiction. We began the unit by reading stories to help us understand the meaning of realistic fiction. The children learned that a story could be made up but could actually happen in real life. We

learned about what makes a good story and how important it is to include the key elements: Beginning, Middle, and End. The students all wrote and illustrated their own realistic fiction stories! Keep up the great work first graders!

In Math, the children have been working with five and ten relationships. We learned how to show numbers on a ten frame and find parts of ten.

The first graders had a wonderful time on their field trip to Philipsburg Manor in Sleepy Hollow, New York! We had the experience of "touching the past" and having a hands on experience of what life was like in colonial days. The children had a great time learning how to make wheat.

A Nifty November in Grade 4

November has been a whirlwind in Fourth Grade. Don't be fooled by the days off, we have worked extra hard to cram fun-filled learning into this shortened month. To celebrate Veteran's Day, we were invited to Bergenfield High School to honor the courageous Veterans that served our country. The marching band showcased the progression of Bergenfield students through the music program as they performed emotional patriotic songs to pay tribute to the many heroes in attendance.

Our Fourth Grade scientists have been fully submerged into our Science units. Following the stages of the scientific method, we have conducted many hands-on experiments. These investigations have satisfied our inquiries regarding *Measurement, Magnetism and Electricity*. Students in 4W learned that it is absolutely necessary to use a standard unit in order to get consistent measurements. To estimate classroom objects, we discovered that we could use our pinky to represent a centimeter and an arm and a half to represent a meter. These references help us to get close to the actual measurements. In 4A, the students built closed circuits to power motors and light bulbs. Students learned that in order for electricity to flow, the path must be closed in the circuit.

The fourth graders have continued on their journey through history. The fourth graders have become interested to learn how the first European settlers interacted with the Delaware (the Native Americans of the New Jersey area). The students became filled with awe as they realized how hard the Native Americans and the colonists had to work just to survive. The fourth graders have predicted that a war is approaching, as they have learned of the increasing tensions between the colonists and the British government. Are they right? We will just have to wait and see! Check back next month to see where we are on our journey through history!

In Writer's Workshop, the students have been working on Personal/Persuasive Essays. Students collected many ideas in which they formed an opinion. From that opinion, they cultivated a personal statement of belief. Such as, "Animals should never be abused", or "Students should have gym every day in elementary school." Next, students were required to generate supporting details along with anecdotes and examples to accompany their statement of belief. Finally, students formulated a 5 paragraph personal/persuasive essay.

Last but not least, November wouldn't be November, unless we talk a little "Turkey!" Thanksgiving was the catalyst for many exciting activities. In Math, we created Turkey friends to help us master those tricky multiplication facts. Our grand culminating activity was our annual Thanksgiving Day Feast. Thank you to all the parents who donated their time and effort into making such a wonderful experience for our students. We are so very thankful for all that you do for every member of our Jefferson School family.

November to Remember in 5th Grade

November was very busy even though it was the shortest month of our school year.


In Reading, the fifth graders wrapped up a novel study on *Loser* and will begin reading *Bridge to Terabithia* by Katherine Paterson. The various skills

under review are making inferences, asking questions, and using prior knowledge. We will also use the book to explore different types of figurative language and how an author uses this technique to convey meaning. As we explore various fantasy stories, students will also begin working on writing their own fantasy fiction story.

In Math, the students completed Unit 3, Geometry Explorations. Protractors, compasses, rulers and the geometry templates were just a few of the tools the students used to investigate triangles, quadrangles, and polygons. Throughout this unit, the students classified geometric shapes and angles, as well as found the measures of angles in polygons. The students were also introduced to tessellations. As a class, we read *A Cloak for the Dreamer* by Aileen Friedman, which allowed the students to visually understand what tessellations are and how they are formed. Our next unit will focus on division.

In Science, the students continued exploring various topics relating to Earth Science. We completed several experiments to help us better understand concepts such as the water cycle, air pressure, wind, and the weather. *BrainPop* videos were regularly included in lessons to help demonstrate these concepts. As we wrap up our unit of study on the Water Planet, we will move to a new Physical Science unit to learn all about lever and pulley systems.

In Social Studies, we finished learning about the five Regions in the United States. The students will begin studying Life in the English Colonies. They will explore the types of work and trade that was needed during the colonial era. They will also learn that children their age were signing contracts to be apprentices and would not be released of their duty until they were 21 years of age. They made comparisons between their lives and those of the children during the colonial times. The students will also explore how life was different in the different regions of the colonies.
